How to Lead a Devotional Hour

- **1.** Decide on the format you're going to use for your devotional hour.
- **2.** Decide on a routine to use for your prep time.
- **3.** Give yourself margin in your prep time.
- **4.** Don't wait until the last minute.
- **5.** Prepare your devotional.
 - a Select your verse.
 - **b** Read it in its context.
 - **c** Meditate on it.
 - **d** Summarize it in one sentence.
 - e Think of a concrete example that illustrates your main point.
 - f Think of five discussion questions for your discussion time.
- 6. Print out copies of your discussion questions to give your teams during their discussion time.
- 7. Holding your devotional hour
 - a Arrive early.
 - **b** Set up chairs in a semicircle to encourage a relaxed atmosphere.
 - c Have name tags ready.
 - **d** Start on time regardless of who is present.
 - e Talk about your notes, don't read your notes verbatim. (If you can't remember your devotional, don't expect anyone else to.)
 - **f** Split up into groups for discussion and pass out your discussion questions.
 - **g** Come back together for a time of last minute planning.
 - **h** Make sure everyone knows what team they are on and who their care receiver is.
 - i Head out to serve your care receivers!

Preparing Your Teams for Their First Service Day

- **1.** The first service day for your teams and care receivers will be different from succeeding service days.
- **2.** At the end of your first devotional time, during your last-minute planning, remind your teams that the primary purpose of their first service day is to get to know each other and their care receiver.
- 3. Encourage team members to spend time introducing themselves and talking with their care receiver.
- 4. Then have your team members and their care receiver do a walk-through of the house and grounds.
- 5. They should make a list of potential projects.
- 6. Then they should prioritize the projects and make plans.
- 7. Encourage your teams to begin with some simple projects before attacking difficult ones.

Checklist After Watching this Video

- ✓ Contact team callers individually on Thursday or Friday to make sure they fulfilled their role
